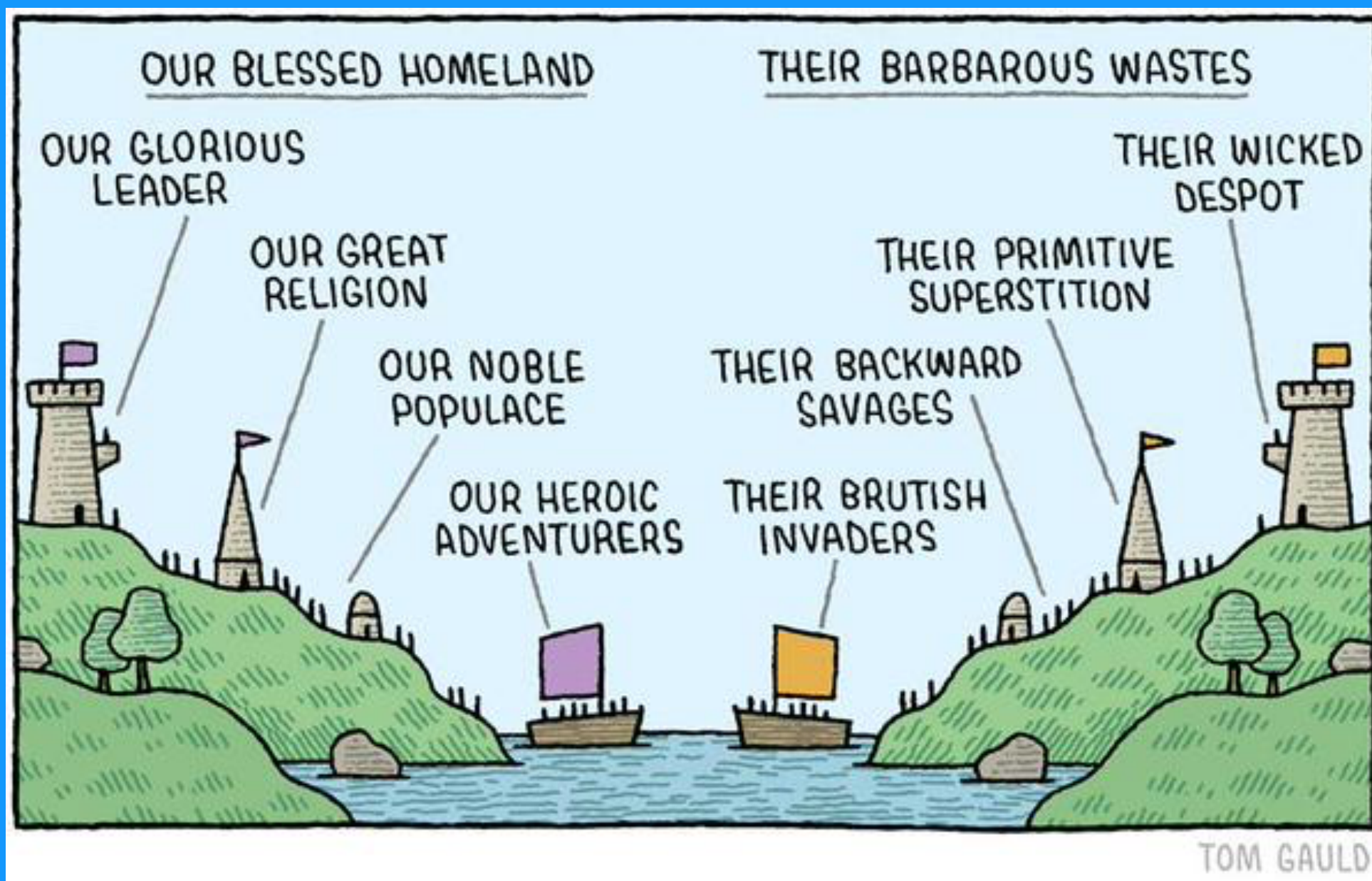
Tribalism, political conflict, and person communities

*Critics declare Tribalists ignore and distort facts

*Tribalists are driven to win for their side

*Tribalists invalidate the perspective of the other side

The Politically Motivated Research Paradigm

MC theorists claim to have evidence that person's act irrationally

*The basic structure of the studies described.

—“confirmation bias”

—“backfire effect”.

* System 1 and System 2 processing

— Intuitive, affective processes drive persons to misperceive.

—System 2 is generally too weak to override System 1.

*A sense that elites, trusted sources, peers all can be influential,

*“Original sin” of humans being prone to irrational thought.

Problematic PMRP

1. **Irrational Persons:** The explanation depends on describing persons as acting impulsively, emotionally, and more generally irrationally without regard to the facts.
2. **Degrading Groups:** The concept of tribal has been associated with such notions as uncivilized or savage in the past and has served as a degradation for particular groups.
3. **Non-reflexivity trap:** The argument from pundits who regard the MC research as support for tribalism undercuts itself since this way of talking indicts the critic as well as those observed to be acting tribally.

Tribes and Tribalism: A different perspective

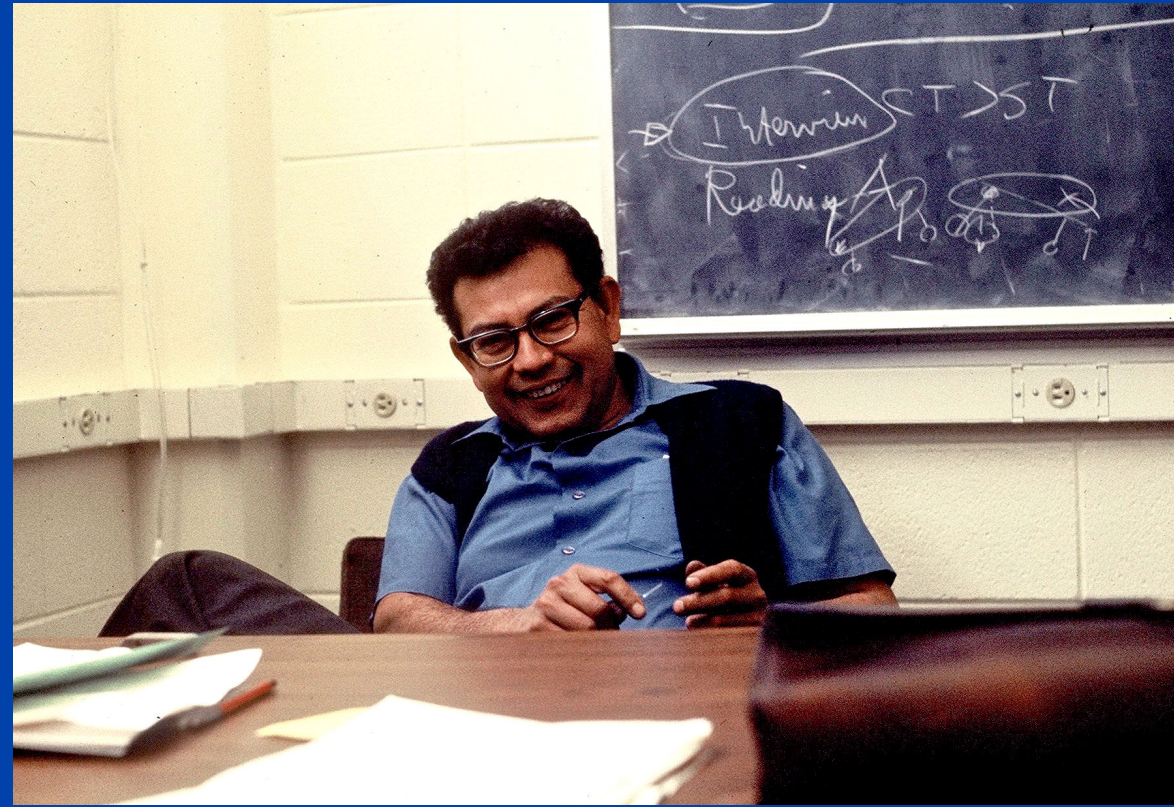

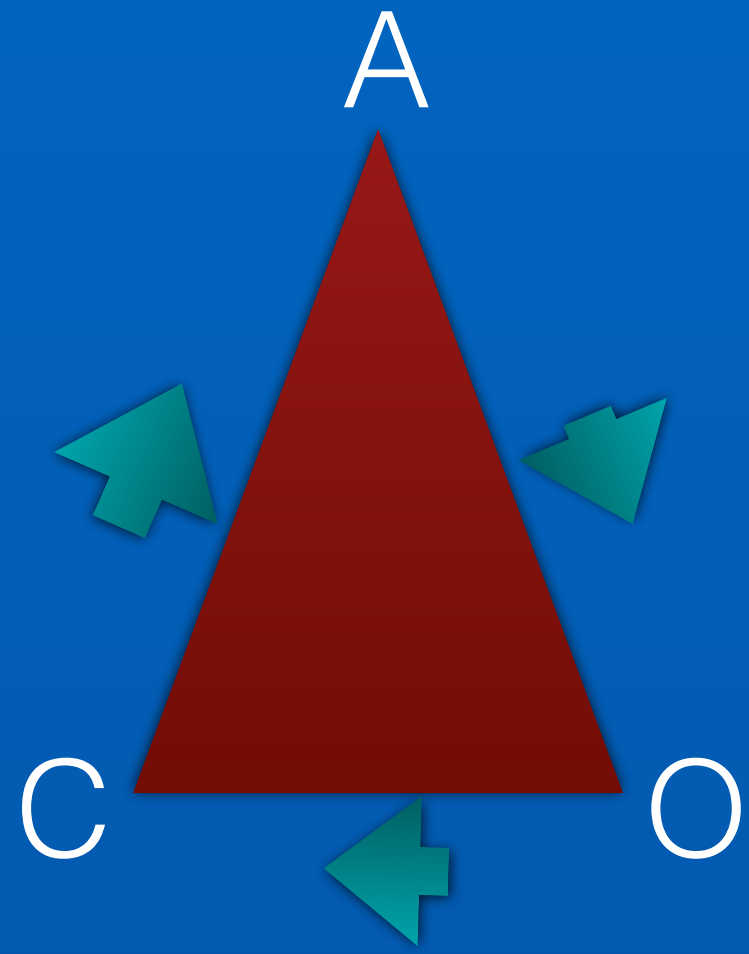

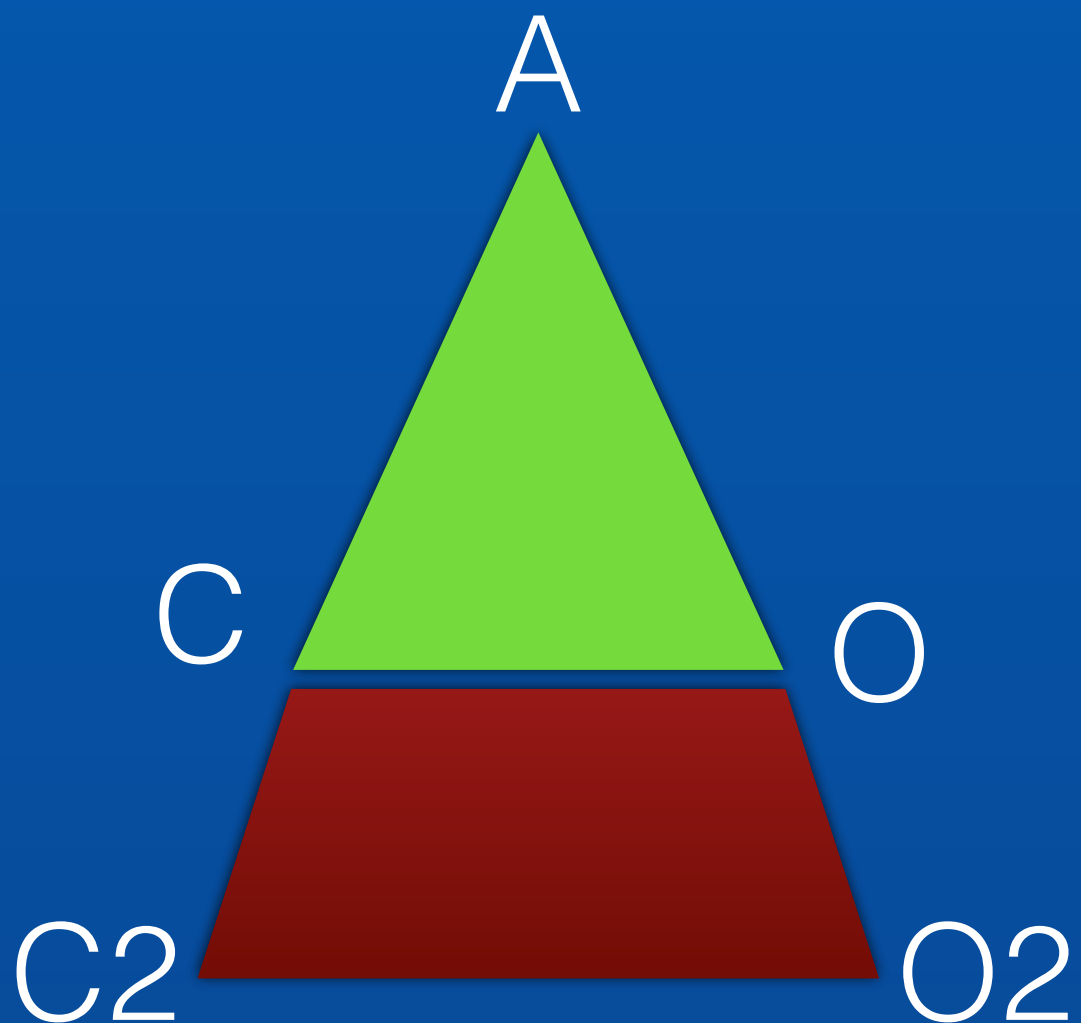
Conflict, Criticism, and Trusted Sources

Although persons live in their own worlds, they live in communities, act within sets of relationships, which allow for mistakes to be corrected and worlds and world views to change.

Communities have members with statuses that help check, regulate, and otherwise manage the social practices of the community.



Although persons disagree all the time about matters of fact, it's these self regulatory and community regulatory social critics that allow person relationships, person communities, person cultures, to work.

Emotional Relationships and Rational Choices

“Within the first half second after hearing a statement, partisan brains are already reacting differently. These initial flashes of neural activity are the elephant, leaning slightly, which then causes their riders to reason differently, search for different kinds of evidence, and reach different conclusions. 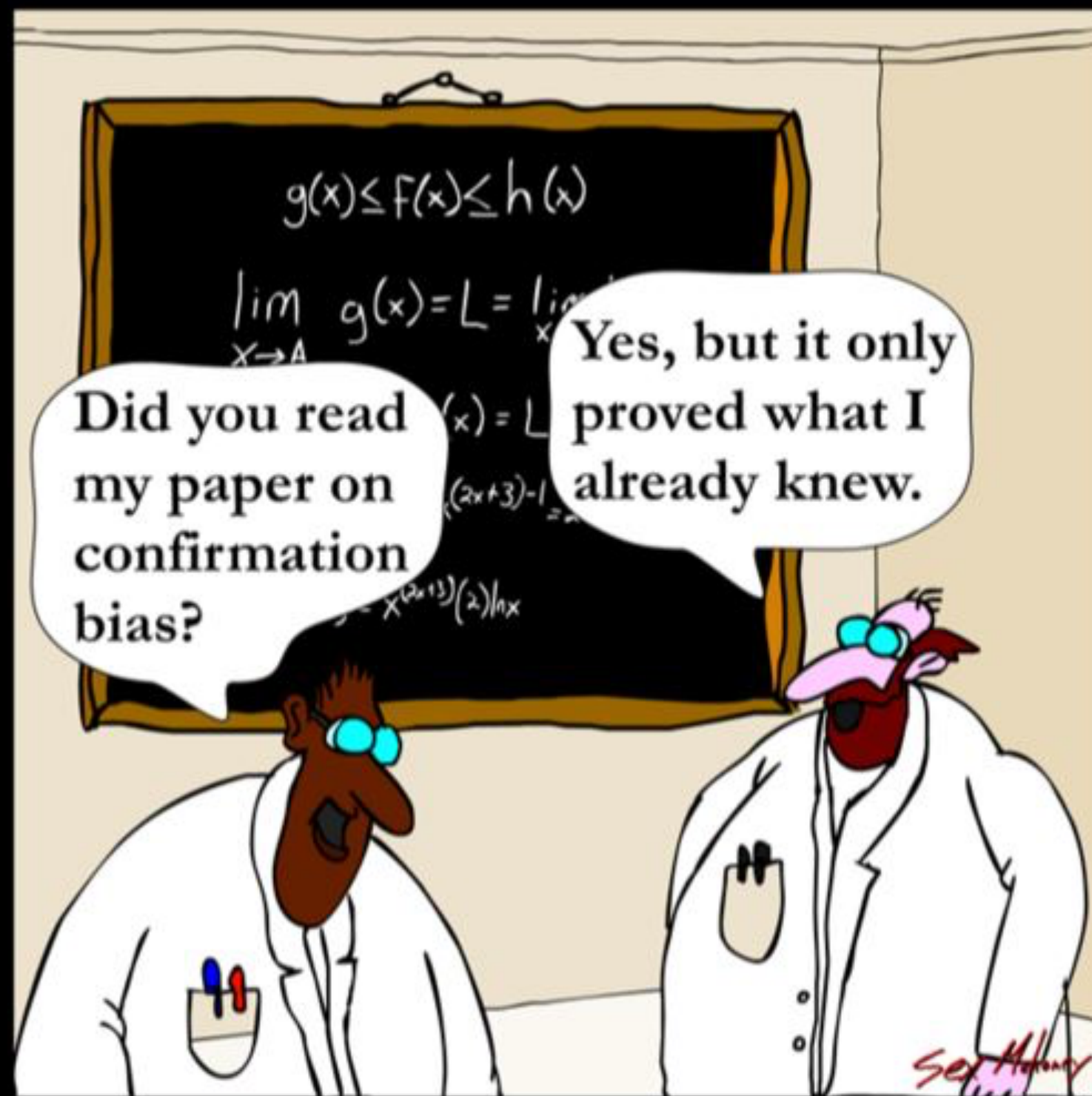
